
Thanks be for all who share fellowship with us, in our Church and in our daily life.

### From the Minister's Desk.

. "When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them." (Acts 2:1-3)



Playing with my grandson, I can find my son (his dad) in the little life: his stubbornness and fussy eating resembles his dad. I am often amazed by the similarities found among family members. I'm more shocked to note similitudes across races, cultures, and languages. We human beings are all very much the same, sharing 99.9 percent of our DNA in our genetic makeup with any other person, anywhere.

Not only among humans, but also more astonishing is to know that our DNA only differs by 1.3 percent from that of a chimpanzee. According to scientific reports, we share 90 percent of our genes with cats, 82 percent with dogs, 80 percent with cows, about 60 percent with both chickens and fruit flies, and even 50 percent with a banana. Now, that's bananas!


Since the Babel Tower story in the Book of Genesis, the Bible tells us, people have been separated by geography, national boundaries, and even languages. In Pentecost, that Babel Tower story is overturned; the Holy Spirit brings people to Christ Jesus, and draws them together in unity, communion, and communication. In light of the biblical light, and scientific perspective of genetic commonality, the way we still hold onto geographical territories, and our fanatic justification of linguistic and cultural divides, seems to start looking a little strange, and non-missional. An important goal of being a church is to live together in Christ, in whom we are united and given a new identity in new language, language of love. Whether from one post code to another, one generation to another, or even one species to another, we are all a part of God's grand and beautiful creation, and it is through the grace of Christ, that we continue uniting.

#### Jean Himmelhoch

26 November 1927-22 March 2023



Jean Himmelhoch lived a life of service to others, and her commitment to our Church over many years was notable. We acknowledge her life with gratitude.

Jean Constance Andrews was born in Wahroonga and attended Abbotsleigh School. She lost her mother when only 7 years of age, and life was not always easy for the young Jean. Nevertheless, Jean seems to have chosen a caring role early, as at University she chose to specialise in Social Studies as part of her Arts degree.

In her early 20's, Jean went to the UK on a working holiday, and there met up with Albert Himmelhoch, who was then studying paediatrics in London - whom she already knew.

They fell in love and were married in 1954 by Revd Leonard Small, later to be Moderator of the Church of Scotland. This was the beginning of a continuing association with Dr Small which benefited Killara Uniting Church as Dr Small preached at our Church on a number of occasions. His sermons were much appreciated. Jean was a long term elder and church councillor and acted as pastoral carer before there was such a position recognised within the church. She was alert to need and ready to provide support, whether it be to the Minister or a member of the congregation and did not flinch from supporting those grievously ill. Revd Chris Udy, who, as Minister valued Jean's caring role, states:

... Jean's natural gift for empathy, as well as her life experience working alongside Albert in medical practice, meant she could see, and reinforce, the necessary boundary between a sharing of concerns for thoughtful planning, and simply telling stories or spreading gossip.

Jean always spoke carefully, and sparingly, and she modelled that quiet, creative, redemptive love we see in the life of Jesus.

Jean was always a wonderful companion. She was intelligent, well-informed, able to make honest observations and creative suggestions ... She was also generous, and when she set high standards it was to make sure her family, and her friends, and all she welcomed into her hospitality and care would know that they were valued and respected.

She was a fully rounded personality and in leisure moments, enjoyed outdoor activities together: sailing, bushwalks and golf. Family was very important and brought much pleasure to Jean.

## Congratulations to Jessica!



#### **Biggest Morning Tea 2023**

On 11<sup>th</sup> May, Killara Uniting Church again hosted a Biggest Morning Tea in aid of the Cancer Council. There was a huge array of raffle prizes, for which we thank the many generous businesses and individuals.

Margaret Bell, a qualified nurse and midwife, spoke of her work with Medecins sans Frontieres, in places where facilities were basic or lacking – but where rewards were immense as was the gratitude of the people helped.

Jacqui Greenfield of the Cancer Council described the ways in which it used the funds raised:

For research: \$19.8 million given for this purpose last year

Support for cancer sufferers, information resources, advice on financial issues

Community awareness of cancer risks (e.g. skin cancer risk of golfers)

Lobbying to change laws and policies by publicizing risks of practices (e.g. of solariums and of vaping)

This year's effort raised \$16,300, and over the 13 years that Susan Mitchell has been organising the event, approximately \$103,500 has been raised for the Cancer Council, a very significant amount. Sue thanks the team helping her, but the greatest thanks must go to Sue herself for her drive and enthusiasm in directing the event.

Lastly, but not least, we thank Gregory and Carr, Funeral Directors, who have supported our event and provided the delicious morning tea.

#### A Safe Church

We would like to maintain Killara Uniting Church as a safe place to visit and worship.

Following the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, and in line with other community institutions, Australian churches are forming procedures to avoid risk of abuse such as has happened in the past within institutions, including churches. Abuse can take various forms, including bullying and neglect, and is not limited to that directed towards children, but extends to anyone in a vulnerable situation.

If you believe that someone within our church has acted wrongly towards you, whether it be harassment, bullying or more serious abuse, the procedure is:

Inform one of our Church's Safe Church Contact people. Safe Church contacts are:

Revd Yangrae Son (0412 031 921), Rosalind Hobbes (0408 499 029), Dr Andrew Wines (0409 437 401) and Julie Sekhon (0400 631 739.

He/she will discuss the situation with you and the process to move forward. Action may involve counselling, changing church structures, or further referral.

If the abuse was serious, and subject to Government legislation, our Church is obliged to report it to the appropriate authorities. Reporting is mandatory.

There is a yellow Safe Church folder in the Church Office. This includes a document entitled 'Information and Referral Services' which can be consulted by any Church member at any time.
